CORRIGENDUM

Subject: Conduct of Computer-Based Test (CBT) for empanelment of **Legal Research Consultants (LRCs) and Junior Research Consultants (JRCs) on a contract basis.**

The National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) is conducting a Computer-Based Test (CBT) for eligible candidates on 27th September 2026 for empanelment of Legal Research Consultants (LRCs) and Junior Research Consultants (JRCs) on a contract basis.

It has been decided that all candidates are allowed to appear for the examination, and they can be subsequently called upon to produce necessary certificates to show that they fulfil the essential qualifications.

Accordingly, the portal for filling the **exam city preferences has been re-opened up to 18th Sep 2026**. All candidates who have not yet given their preferences for the exam city are advised to visit the official CBT portal for submission of required information and other examination-related details and further updates:

Candidates who have already given their preferences for the city of exam need not take any action.

In this regard, all candidates will receive examination-related communication through the email ID noreply@exam-info.com

If any candidate fails to indicate his/ her preference for the examination city/ centre within the prescribed period, an examination city/ centre will be allocated to them by the examination-conducting agency. Any subsequent request for a change of examination city/ centre shall not be entertained.

Candidates are advised to regularly check the inboxes of their registered email addresses, including the spam/ junk folder, for any communication regarding the CBT.

Candidates are further advised to rely only on the information/ communication issued through the above-mentioned portal and email ID, and to remain cautious of any unauthorised communication or fraudulent websites.

The Syllabi for the Computer Based Test (CBT) for LRCs and JRCs are provided below in this notice for information and reference of the eligible candidates.

Syllabus for Legal Research Consultants (LRCs)

The questions shall broadly cover the following areas:

(a) Statutory & Institutional Framework

Questions relating to the **Protection of Human Rights Act, 1993 and its regulation; NHRC guidelines concerning custodial deaths.**

(b) Constitutional Law & Judicial Doctrines

Fundamental Rights and Directive Principles under Part III & IV of the Constitution, particularly Articles 14, 19, 21, 21A, 22, 23 and 24; the expanding scope of Article 21, including privacy, healthcare, clean environment, legal aid and dignity; Articles 32 and 226; Directive Principles; Public Interest Litigation; sovereign immunity in the context of human rights violations; and important constitutional and human rights judgments.

(c) Criminal Law & Custodial Safeguards

Provisions relating to Arrest, remand, investigation, and bail under the **Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973 and the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023 (BNSS)**, particularly safeguards against arbitrary detention; custodial deaths and police atrocities; magisterial inquiries; post-mortem procedures and video recording; prison reforms, including rights of undertrials.

Provisions under **Indian Penal Code, 1860 and Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, 2023.**

Provisions under **Indian Evidence Act, 1872 and Bharatiya Sakshya Adhiniyam, 2023.**

(d) Vulnerable Groups & Special Legislation

Questions concerning protection of women and children, including the **POCSO Act, 2012, Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015**, and the **Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005**; protection of marginalized communities under the **Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes (Prevention of Atrocities) Act, 1989**; the **Transgender Persons (Protection of Rights) Act, 2019**; **Bonded Labour System (Abolition) Act, 1976**; **Child and Adolescent Labour (Prohibition and Regulation) Act, 1986.**

(e) International Human Rights Law

Questions relating to the principal international human rights instruments, including the **Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR)**, **International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR)**, **International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (ICESCR)**, **Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW)**, **Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC)**, and **Convention against Torture (UNCAT)**; the **Paris Principles** governing National Human Rights Institutions.
