Human rights panel issues notice over EB staff's death

THE State Human Rights Commission have issued a notice to the director of TANGEDCO over the incident of two of his workers being electrocated to death near Sowcarpet while repairing a transformer on January 1. Taking cognisance of the issue based on a report that appeared in a Tamil daily the SHRC in has saked the chairman and managing director of TANGED-CO to file a report on the action taken against the officers responsible for the workers' death. Vincent (40) and Udaya (45) had climbed up a transformer on Avudai Naicken Street in Kothawai Chavadi after a power outage was reported in the locality Minutes later, both the men were thrown to the ground after receiving an electric shock. Both succumbed to the injuries.

"Whatever happened is very bad. I think we should keep politics and education separate.

Delhi University assistant professor and former JNU alumnus Syed Areesh Ahmad said those with political differences knew "how to agree to disagree" when he had been a student there 15 years ago. Endless debates would end with a shared meal or a cigarette.

"What is happening at JNU today is the crushing of dissent by brute force by the current political regime where the police is tust a mute spectator," said Ahmad.
