

NHRC Special Rapporteur Inspects Sadar Hospital in Jamshedpur

Report Highlights Shortcomings and Recommendations for Improved Medical Facilities

JAMSHEDPUR – Suchitra Singha, Special Rapporteur of the National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) and former IAS officer, conducted an inspection of Sadar Hospital in Jamshedpur.

She collected data on the hospital's deficiencies and submitted her findings to the NHRC.

The inspection covered all departments, with discussions held with the Hospital Superintendent to address the identified issues and improve medical services.

Key shortcomings included a shortage of specialist doctors, such as general physicians, orthopedic surgeons, gynecologists, and other specialists, resulting in patients being deprived of adequate medical care.

Currently, the hospital has two operation theatres, but there is a need for a modular operation theatre to enhance service quality.

The Civil Surgeon stated that a demand letter for a modular operation theatre had been sent to the Health, Medical Education and Family Welfare Department of Jharkhand, as per instructions from the Principal Secretary.

The Malnutrition Treatment Center at Sadar Hospital is not operational due to space constraints and lack of departmental approval.

Singha emphasized the importance of having at least one functional Malnutrition Treatment Center.

The hospital also faces a shortage of essential machines and equipment, including an ultrasound machine, which is currently operated under an MOU with Health Map.

Sadar Hospital lacks its own ultrasound machine and needs an additional portable USG machine.

A 300-mA digital X-ray machine has been in use for the past 10 years, and there is a need for the latest ultrasound, CT scan, and MRI machines.

The hospital has four dialysis machines but requires three more to meet patient demand.

Additionally, the hospital's blood bank lacks a separator unit despite having available space.

A 100-bed pre-fabricated hospital building is under construction behind the current facility.

Once completed, this will allow previously non-operational departments, such as Geriatric, Milk Bank, and MTC, to become functional.

During her inspection, Singha also reviewed the OPD, emergency ward, dialysis center, women's ward, pediatric ward, ICU, and other departments.

NHRC kicks off month-long internship program for students

80 students from diverse backgrounds to explore human rights among other courses.

The National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) has begun its month-long Summer Internship Programme for university-level students from across the country. A total of 80 students from diverse academic backgrounds have been selected to participate in the programme, its official press release noted.

The internship programme was inaugurated by NHRC Secretary General, Bharat Lal, in New Delhi.

In his inaugural address, Mr. Lal appealed to the students to imbibe the Indian ethos of empathy and compassion to protect and promote human rights.

He emphasised the importance of drawing inspiration from the lives and works of Mahatma Gandhi, Nelson Mandela, and other who have dedicated their entire lives to improving the lives of others.

Mr. Lal further said that the present generation is enjoying the fruits of hard work put by their earlier generations. It is their sacred duty to make this planet Earth and society a better place for coming generations.

The month-long internship programme will provide the students with an opportunity to explore the diverse aspects of human rights and understand the significance of exercising fundamental rights. The programme will also enable them to visit jails, police stations, and other government/NGO shelter homes to gain a first-hand understanding of their functioning.

No treatment for malnutrition in Sadar Hospital Jamshedpur

Jamshedpur, June 11: Special Rapporteur of the National Human Rights Commission, New Delhi and former IAS, Suchitra Singha inspected the Sadar Hospital of Jamshedpur. She collected data about the shortcomings in the hospital and submitted her report to the National Human Rights Commission (NHRC).

All departments were inspected and the problems with the concerned departments were discussed with the Hospital Superintendent to provide better medical facilities. The shortcomings that were found included a shortage of specialist doctors in the hospital like general physicians, orthopaedic surgeons, gynaecologists, and physicians leading to patients being deprived of better medical services.

Presently, two operation theatres were available in the hospital. There was a need for modular operation theatre for better quality service. The Civil Surgeon informed that on the instructions of the Principal Secretary, Health, Medical Education and Family Welfare Department, and the Government of Jharkhand, the demand letter for modular operation theatre had to be sent to the department.

The Malnutrition Treatment Center at Sadar Hospital was not in use due to lack of space and non-approval from the department. At least one Malnutrition Treatment Center must be available and it shall be operable after getting approval from the department, noted the NHRC Special Rapporteur. The Malnutrition Treatment Center was an integral part of the hospital.

It was found that there was a shortage of certain machines and equipment in the hospital like the ultrasound machine, currently operated under MOU by Health Map. Sadar Hospital, Jamshedpur does not have its ultrasound machine available which requires another machine in addition to a portable USG machine. A 300-mA digital X-ray machine has been in use for the last 10 years. The hospital needed the latest ultrasound machines, CT scan machines, and MRI machines. Four dialysis machines were in use at the hospital. Considering the large number of patients, three more dialysis machines were required. The hospital's blood bank did not have a separator unit in spite of space being available.

A 100-bed pre-fabricated hospital building was under construction behind the hospital. Once the transfer was completed, departments that were not in operation due to the lack of space would be operational, like the Geriatric, Milk bank, MTC, among others. In addition to the above, Singha also inspected the OPD, emergency ward, dialysis centre, women's ward, paediatric ward, ICU, and other departments.

Amara Raja eyeing 30GWh EV battery cell mfg in T'gana

Hyderabad: Amara Raja Energy & Mobility Ltd, formerly known as Amara Raja Batteries Ltd, is looking at doubling its initially proposed EV (electric vehicles) battery cell manufacturing capacity of 16GWh to over 30GWh by 2035, top officials of the company said on Monday.

This even as the firm is already all set to commence phase-1 commercial production of its 5GWh EV battery pack assembly facility at Divitipally in Mahbubnagar shortly.

“We committed to govt to set up a 16GWh EV battery cell manufacturing and 5GWh of battery pack assembly in phase-1 but by 2035 we expect to have over 30GWh of cell manufacturing and around 5-6GWh of pack assembly,” Amara Raja Advanced Cell Technologies chief operations officer (COO) Niranjan C said.

“We acquired land through govt support and the groundwork for multiple gigafactories has started. Of the 5GWh pack assembly capacity, 1.5GWh facility is almost ready for starting commercial production. Maybe in the next one or two months we will be inaugurating it,” Niranjan explained.

रिपोर्ट में कमियों पर प्रकाश डाला गया और बेहतर चिकित्सा सुविधाओं के लिए सिफारिशों की गईं

जमशेदपुर – राष्ट्रीय मानवाधिकार आयोग (एनएचआरसी) की विशेष प्रतिवेदक एवं पूर्व आईएस अधिकारी सुचित्रा सिंहा ने जमशेदपुर सदर अस्पताल का निरीक्षण किया।

उन्होंने अस्पताल की कमियों पर आंकड़े एकत्र किये और अपने निष्कर्ष एनएचआरसी को सौंपे।

निरीक्षण में सभी विभाग शामिल थे, तथा पहचाने गए मुद्दों के समाधान और चिकित्सा सेवाओं में सुधार के लिए अस्पताल अधीक्षक के साथ चर्चा की गई।

प्रमुख कमियों में विशेषज्ञ डॉक्टरों, जैसे सामान्य फिजीशियन, आर्थोपेडिक सर्जन, स्त्री रोग विशेषज्ञ और अन्य विशेषज्ञों की कमी शामिल थी, जिसके परिणामस्वरूप मरीज पर्याप्त चिकित्सा देखभाल से वंचित रह जाते थे।

वर्तमान में अस्पताल में दो ऑपरेशन थियेटर हैं, लेकिन सेवा की गुणवत्ता बढ़ाने के लिए एक मॉड्यूलर ऑपरेशन थियेटर की आवश्यकता है।

सिविल सर्जन ने बताया कि प्रधान सचिव के निर्देशानुसार झारखंड के स्वास्थ्य, चिकित्सा शिक्षा एवं परिवार कल्याण विभाग को मॉड्यूलर ऑपरेशन थियेटर के लिए मांग पत्र भेज दिया गया है।

सदर अस्पताल स्थित कुपोषण उपचार केंद्र स्थान की कमी और विभागीय स्वीकृति के अभाव में चालू नहीं हो पा रहा है।

सिंघा ने कम से कम एक कार्यात्मक कुपोषण उपचार केंद्र की महत्ता पर बल दिया।

अस्पताल को आवश्यक मशीनों और उपकरणों की भी कमी का सामना करना पड़ रहा है, जिसमें एक अल्ट्रासाउंड मशीन भी शामिल है, जिसे वर्तमान में हेल्थ मैप के साथ समझौता ज्ञापन के तहत संचालित किया जाता है।

सदर अस्पताल में अपनी अल्ट्रासाउंड मशीन नहीं है और उसे एक अतिरिक्त पोर्टेबल यूएसजी मशीन की आवश्यकता है।

पिछले 10 वर्षों से 300-एमए डिजिटल एक्स-रे मशीन का उपयोग किया जा रहा है, तथा नवीनतम अल्ट्रासाउंड, सीटी स्कैन और एमआरआई मशीनों की आवश्यकता है।

अस्पताल में चार डायलिसिस मशीनें हैं, लेकिन मरीजों की मांग को पूरा करने के लिए तीन और मशीनों की आवश्यकता है।

इसके अतिरिक्त, अस्पताल के रक्त बैंक में स्थान उपलब्ध होने के बावजूद विभाजक इकाई का अभाव है।

वर्तमान सुविधा के पीछे 100 बिस्तरों वाला एक पूर्व-निर्मित अस्पताल भवन निर्माणाधीन है।

इसके पूरा हो जाने पर, इससे पहले बंद पड़े जेरिएट्रिक, मिल्क बैंक और एमटीसी जैसे विभाग भी कार्यशील हो जाएंगे।

निरीक्षण के दौरान उन्होंने ओपीडी, इमरजेंसी वार्ड, डायलिसिस सेंटर, महिला वार्ड, बाल चिकित्सा वार्ड, आईसीयू व अन्य विभागों की भी समीक्षा की।
