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BRIEF HISTORY OF RINPAS


The history of this institute dates back to 1795 A.D. when the Lunatic Asylum was established in Munghyr near the court premises south of the Ganges River. It was shifted to Patna in November 1821 and was located at Patna Collegiate School. Subsequently the Lunatic Asylum was shifted to present location at Kanke, Ranchi in the last week of April 1925. Nomenclature of Lunatic Asylum was changed to Indian Mental Hospital (IMH). Captain J.E. Dhanjibhay was the first Superintendent of IMH. The male wing started functioning on 4th September 1925 with 110 patients. The female wing started functioning with 53 patients on 19th September 1925. Gradually patients from Dacca (Bangladesh) and Berhampur (Orissa) were transferred here. There were 1226 patients on 31st December 1925.

After Independence this hospital came under State Govt. of Bihar and on 30th August 1958 the name of IMH was changed to Ranchi Mansik Arogyashala (RMA). Patients from the states of Eastern India eg. Bihar, West Bengal, Orissa, Manipur, Mizoram, Tripura were kept here and sanctioned bed strength was 1620. However, patients used to be more than 2000. It was matter of pride that the first MD in Psychiatry was awarded to Dr. L. P. Verma from this institute in 1942. However since early seventies of the last century there was overall decline of RMA in care of mental patients, teaching and research. P.G course in Psychiatry discontinued as one by one faculty member left the institute. PIL was filed in Supreme Court by Mr. Rakesh Chandra Narayan on behalf of mental patients regarding the pathetic condition of inmates of RMA. Supreme Court took note of PIL and in its order dated 8 September 1994 directed Govt. of Bihar to notify RMA as autonomous institute. Hon'ble Supreme Court also framed the RMA rules and constituted Management Committee for administrative and financial management of RMA to avoid red tapism. Supreme Court vide its order dated 11-11-1997 entrusted National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) to monitor and supervise the functioning of RMA. On 10th January 1998 the name of RMA was changed to Ranchi Institute of Neuro-Psychiatry & Altied Sciences (RINPAS).

With the support of State Govt. and close monitoring by NHRC, RINPAS is now gradually showing upward trend in the care of people with mental health problems by improving the quality assurance, rehabilitation, community outreach programme, teaching and research activities.

TEACHING & ACADEMIC ACTIVITY


The institute has regular M.Phil and Ph.D courses in Clinical Psychology and Psychiatric Social Work, M.D. and D.P.M. in Psychiatry and D.P.N. in Psychiatric Nursing Department (affiliated to Ranchi University). The Institute is a recognised teaching centre for M.B.B.S. students who are posted here from different medical colleges of Jharkhand and Bihar in different batches for psychiatric training. Visiting students also get training in the Department of Clinical Psychology, Psychiatric Social Work and Psychiatric Nursing. The institute has close liaison with Central Institute of Psychiatry and Rajendra Institute of Medical Sciences in various academic activities like CME, conferences, seminars, clinical meetings and symposia. There is also a regular weekly case conference and seminar in our institute. The institute has five lecture halls each accommodating more than 50 students with provision of audio visual facility. The institute in addition, has two conference halls. The AC and Non AC conference halls have a capacity of 140 and 200 persons respectively. Besides that there is one open air auditorium having capacity of 300 seats. The teaching aid facilities include Over Head Projector, Slide Projector and Multi Media Projector etc.

OUT PATIENT'S DEPARTMENT

The Institute is running an Out Patient's Department since 1958. Day by day this department is becoming more and more popular. The OPD facility is available daily from 9.A.M. to 4.00 P.M. and on gazetted holidays it is from 9.00 AM to 1.00 PM. There is a big and spacious waiting room with capacity to seat 150 patient and their relatives in the OPD Complex. Patients are required to pay a nominal sum of Rs. 20/- only for registration. Free medicines are given to the patients in the OPD for a month. For B.P.L. patients, no registration fee is charged.


In addition to psychiatrists, the services of other specialists e.g. physician, eye specialist, specialist in tropical medicine and dentist are also available. Psychological testing, psychological and psycho-social management, and family counselling services are also available. Pathological examination and other investigation facilities are available in the OPD complex. Physiotherapy unit is also located in the OPD Complex. 

NO. OF INDOOR PATIENTS TREATED



DAILY AVERAGE BED OCCUPANCY


Daily average bed occupancy during the year and previous ten years were as follows:-






The total number of admissions and discharge of male and female patients during the year and the previous ten years were as follows:-




Number of death of indoor patients during the year and previous ten years are as follows:-Showing residence of the patients who were admitted in RINPAS since year 2005






ii) The daily average bed occupancy of paying patients during the year and previous eight years were as follows:-




ESCAPE OF PATIENTS

The recent trend in psychiatry is to allow maximum freedom of movement to patients, as it has been seen that when patients are kept locked up or under any form of restraint, they get highly excited and unmanageable. This principle has been maintained at this hospital and patients are neither restrained nor allowed to be locked up inside the rooms. The wards are always kept open and thus the atmosphere of the hospital has completely changed. Injuries and assaults have become rare. Beside this, there are number of patients who have recovered and are practically sane but unfortunately their guardians/prison authorities are reluctant to take them back inspite of our repeated reminders to the families and prison authorities.

Number of reported escape of indoor patients during the year and previous ten years are as follows:-




Showing length of stay of indoor patients during the year and previous ten years are given below:



This is the largest department with the OPD attendance of about 86,578 patients and about 2514 admissions last year. The department is actively involved in clinical work, teaching and research activities.

In the OPD male and female patients are admitted after a detailed work up, physical examination and investigations. Diagnosis is made according to the ICD-10 classificatory systems. Admission and discharge ratio is being maintained proportionately.

Indoor services include patients' physical and mental care. Weekly assessment of the patient's mental state is done. Quality pharmacological management of the patient is done with injectables, tablets & liquid preparations along with psychotherapy. Newer groups of antipsychotic, antidepressant, mood stabilizers and anti-epileptic drugs are used. E.E.G is done as and when required. E.C.G is done routinely for cardiac problems. Case records are maintained and preserved for patient's detailed information.

Academic activities include regular teaching programmes, lecturers, OPD and ward case discussions. Various research studies are being conducted in the hospital by the psychiatrists in liaison with the other departments of Clinical Psychology and Psychiatric Social Work. Some of the faculty members are in the editorial board of various Journals.

Psychiatrists and Senior residents along with other team members are involved in various community outreach programmes in Hazaribagh[100km], Saraikela[150km], Khunti[35km] and Johna[35km]. This is the nodal institute for implementation of DMHP and OPD services under DMHP has started at Sadar Hospitals in Dumka, Gumla and Daltonganj and Jamshedpur.

Doctors are also visiting the Central Jails of Ranchi, Hazaribagh and Khunti. Doctors also visit the Missionaries of Charity, Ranchi, Remand home located at Ranchi and Sadar Hospital, Ranchi periodically.

Drug De-Addiction Centre

The institute dose not have separate Drug De-addiction centre but has a unit in Ward no.3 where patients are admitted at present. A total of 445 (all Male Patient) patients have registered for de-addiction in 2011-12 and among them 125 (all Male Patient) patients were admitted.

DEPARTMENT OF CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGY


The Department of Clinical Psychology was opened at this hospital on 14th September 1966 when a psychologist was appointed to this hospital. The department was recognised as teaching department affiliated to Ranchi University-we-f-01-4-1998. The department has 12 seats in M.Phil and 4 in Ph.D courses in Clinical Psychology at present.

The faculty is involved in clinical, teaching, research, rural community programme and urban school mental health programmes. This department is equipped with modern neuropsychological test materials and biofeed back machines. Besides carrying out psycho-diagnostic & psychotherapeutic programmes, the faculty members also actively participate in group therapy and research activities. The Deptt has different units for Out-patient and In-patients. Out patients units consists of psycho-diagnostic unit and psycho-therapeutic unit. In-patient units are psycho-diagnostic, neuropsychology, drug de-addiction, behaviour therapy and other psychotherapy procedures. Faculty members and students are actively involved in psychological assessment and psychological management of patients. Work-up of patients at O.P.D. is done regularly by Clinical Psychology students under supervision of faculty members. Students are actively involved in Community Outreach Programmes. Faculty members of the Deptt. are also visiting/guest faculty, member of committee for course and studies, subject expert and external examiners in different Institutions/Organization/ University. The official Journal of Indian Association of Clinical Psychologists and Journal of Projective Psychology & Mental Health are being published by the Deptt. The faculty members are in the editorial board of various Journals and are University examiners. Senior Faculty member is also nominated as RCI Inspector, New Delhi. List of tests and equipments is Appendix-II.

Yoga and Meditation Centre

The Institute has started Yoga and Meditation sessions for both Male and Female Indoor patients by qualified professional in Yoga. Average session attended by one patient is seven. Generally the patients are trained in breathing exercises, relaxation and different types of asanas. Besides this patients are also referred from OPD.

The department of Psychiatric Social work in this institute was opened in the year 1997. The department got recognition as teaching department affiliated to Ranchi University w.e.f. 1st April 1998. Presently the department is running postgraduate M.Phil and Ph.D courses in Psychiatric Social Work. Apart from the teaching and training programme, the department is actively involved in clinical, research, rehabilitation, community mental health, extension services and outreach programmes etc.


Some of the major clinical responsibilities of the department include

- (a) Some of the major therapeutic services include Social Work intervention i.e. practice of Social Case Work, Social Group Work/Group Therapy, Community Organization in community mental health programmes and extension services, counselling services, family intervention and family therapy, home visits, social skills training etc. The department also organizes sociocultural, religious, sports and recreational prgrammes for indoor patients.
- (b) Attending patients in Out and In-patient department for intake interview, case work up, Social history taking for assessing family dynamics & other socio-cultural environmental factors etc.
- (c) Organizing and supervising group meetings in the wards as a form of social group work, one of the primary methods of social work.
- (d) Motivating and encouraging patients to attend O.P.D. for diagnostic, therapeutic and rehabilitative purposes so that they may feel themselves productive and they may not become liabilities to the family once discharged from the hospital and as such they are well accepted in family, community and society as well.

Teaching and training activities / assignments include imparting instruction in formal class through lectures, group discussions, individual and group conferences, field supervision and demonstration, topic discussion and supervising M.Phil trainees and PhD. scholars to present and discuss papers on assigned topics and present cases during academic programmes of the institute. The department also imparts advance training in psychiatric social work to the MSW students placed here from other professional institutions / universities from time to time for their block field work training. The department has also organized professional workshops on orientation programme for prospective professional social workers.

The department takes active part in various research activities independently and also in liaison with other departments of this institute. The faculty member of the department are invited as visiting/guest faculty and external examiner in different institutions/organizations and universities and also member of "Expert Committee" for some of the schools of social work, also the faculty member are in the editorial board of various journals, executive committee, members in various National and International professional organization and curretnly holding post of joint secretary of ISPSW.

The psychiatric social workers posted in various wards screen the patients and send them to occupational therapy unit to regain their impaired and lost capacities so that when they go back to the community they are no more considered as a burden for others. One psychiatric social worker is posted in the occupational therapy unit to monitor and supervise the activities carried out by the patients. Efforts are made to guide them suitably according to their capabilities to develop their optimum level of skills and capacities to lead a productive life in the community after discharge from the hospital.

Pathology department of RINPAS is well equipped with latest diagnostic tools/instruments. It is located conveniently near the out patient department of hospital.

It consists of the following section:-


- i) Haematology

We have the following diagnostic tools:

- i) Fully automatic bio-chemistry analyser (Super Stat 919)
- ii) Semi automatic chemistry analyser (ERBA CHEM-5 Plus)
- iii) Instalyte (Na/K/Li) Analyser for performing various biochemical test
- iv) Fully automatic hematology analyser (Sysmex SF 3000) for complete blood count (CBC) & other hematological investigations.
- v) ELISA Reader

Reports are delivered on routine haematological, biochemical & clinical investigation to the patients on the same day. Facilities of various Pathological Tests available in hospital laboratory is annexed (**Appendix-III**).

The following table shows the work load in the pathological laboratory during the period under review and previous eight years.



Work load of E.E.G.




There is increase in E.E.G. investigation in both indoor and outdoor patients.

DEPARTMENT OF OPHTHALMOLOGY

One Eye Specialist and one Ophthalmic Assistant are presently working in this department. Three trainees are being trained as Ophthalmic Assistants.

It provides regular OPD facilities for patients of the surrounding areas with eye complaints. It also caters to the needs of the In-patients of the institute as and when required. The facilities for Consultation, Refraction, Tonometry, Slit Lamp examination, Ophthalmoscopy and Biometry are available in the OPD. Till July 2012 a total of 26048 OPD cases and 1433 indoor patients have been treated.

The Eye OPD is equipped with following equipment:-

- i) Computerized Autorefractometer
- ii) Schiotz Tonometer
- iii) Slit lamp Biomicroscope
- iv) A-scan Bio-meter
- v) Keratometer-
- vi) · Ophthalmoscope
- vii) Streak Retinoscope
- viii) Colour Vision Chart

The Eye Operation Theatre is equipped with following equipment:-

- i) Operating Microscope
- ii) Phaco-emulsification unit
- iii) Set of Instrument for cataract and phaco-surgery
- iv) Auto clave

Eye operation theatre started functioning since December 2004. IOL (Intraocular Lens) is being implanted in cataract patients who are found suitable for this procedure, otherwise simple conventional cataract operation is performed. All cataract operations are being done free of charge. Patients are followed up after one week, two weeks and at the end of six weeks. Glasses are prescribed for these patients six weeks after operation. In addition to this, minor surgical procedures are also carried out for out-patients and in-patients of the institute. Till July 2012 a total of 534 cases have been operated out of which 333 cases were of Cataract. The following table shows the work load of the Ophthalmology department during the year and previous eight years.

The Department of Dental Surgery started functioning in the RINPAS OPD complex w.e.f 28th Oct.2005. At present a Dental Surgeon and one Staff Nurse is posted in the department. The department provides services to OPD patients and Psychiatric in-patients. The unit is air-conditioned and has generator facility.



LIBRARY

Medical Library

There is a Central Library for the staff and students of the Institute. The library is equipped with the latest books on psychiatry, neurology, clinical psychology, psychiatric social work, psychiatric nursing, medicine and other related subjects. More than ten thousand books are available in the library. The library is subscribing 58 foreign journals and 7 Indian Journals.

The computerization of Central Library has started. In this regard nine PCs have been installed. A new phone connection for Internet facility has already been taken for Central Library. Library Automation and Networking software "e-Granthalaya" developed by NIC, New Delhi has been installed with the help of NIC, Ranchi. All the books entered in computer.




PHYSIOTHERAPY UNIT

The Institute started this department in February, 2000. A trained and experienced physiotherapist is posted here.

Different type of outdoor and indoor patients are attending the Physiotherapy deptt. Patients with musculo-skeletal problems, neurological, congenital disabilities, polio, post-burn contracture, geriatric problems etc are evaluated and treated. The department has the following equipments:-

- Ultra Sound
- Electrical Stimulation
- Transcutaneous electrical nerve stimulator (TENS)
- Intermittent & static cervical and pelvic traction set
- Paraffin wax bath
- Rowing machine
- Static cycle
- Shoulder wheel

- Quadriceps table
- Pegs board set
- Passive knee mobilizer
- Treadmill.

OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY & REHABILITATION UNIT

The institute has a full fledged occupational therapy and rehabilitation unit offering comprehensive vocational training to in-patients. The primary objective of the department is to train patients in different skills, so that they are not a liability and burden to their families and society. The process of rehabilitation also enables patients to find and maintain gainful employment after their discharge. This further increases their acceptability by their family and community members, thereby reducing the stigma attached to psychiatric illnesses.

Patients who work in the OT sections earn tokens according to their level of skill and performance. A token economy system operates wherein, skilled and semi-skilled patients earn Rs. 20 & Rs. 10 daily respectively. Patients who just come and sit in O.T. Section are paid Rs. 5 per day to motivate and inculcate in them the habit to work. Patients exchange the tokens earned for snacks and tea from the canteen and rest savings they take home on discharge. In 2011 -2012 total 632 patients attended the section out of which 376 were involved in unskilled work, 241 in semi skilled work and 15 in skilled work.

AGRICULTURE, HORTICULTURE, POULTRY AND DAIRY UNIT

Computer Training

This institute has a separate Agriculture & Horticulture section covering 105 acres (approx) of land of which about 90 acres land have been fenced with stone wall where paddy, pluses and vegetables are grown in about 50 acres & rest is orchard of mangoes & lichhis. 34 acres baren land has been fanced and we plan to extend agriculture area once provisioin of water supply is made.

Poultry and Dairy Farm have started functioning and these units are supplying Chicken, Milk and milk products like Ghee and Dahi besides Organic manure. However due to Bird Flu Poultry unit was closed down last year as per order of State Govt. It has now restarted. Comprative chart attached (Appendix-V).

COMPUTERISATION

Computer facilities along with LAN is available in all the Section of RINPAS. Computer training for staff is organized.

BASIC AMENITIES FOR THE PATIENTS

Mineral water is supplied to each ward. All the wards have water cooler, Colour T.V., Indoor and outdoor games.

Provision of Indoor games like Carrom, Ludo, Playing cards etc. are in the wards.

Provision of Outdoor game - patients are encouraged to take part in football, volleyball in the male section and ring game in the female section. Patients are also encouraged to take part in flower and kitchen garden around their wards.

Patients also take part in cultural activities like music, recitation etc.

Action aid workers have been made responsible for nearly 30 dull and apathetic female patients to make them active and social and these patients are showing gradual response.

Food

Patients are given nourishing diet. Egg, milk, are given routinely besides good quality atta, rice, dal and vegetables. Nonvegetarian items like chicken/ fish are given thrice a week & paneer twice a week for non veg., for vegetarian patients paneer is given five times in a week. Curd 100 gram three days a week. Besides this, seasonal fruits are routinely given to patients and rice khir is given once a week to the patient. During evening tea either 50 gm bun / 2 Slice Rusk/ 2 Biscuits is served along with tea (Appendix - VI).

Special Feasts

Special feasts are given to all patients during Holi, Durga Puja, Eid, Christmas. Refreshments are provided to staff and patients during Republic Day and Independence Day. Patients are allowed to observe fast etc. on different festive occasions such as Jansmastmi, Roja etc.

Special Activities for Patient

Annual sports day was organized for patients in which male patients, female patients, officers, students and staff of RINPAS participated actively.

Annual patient picnic was organized in Agriculture and Horticulture section of RINPAS.

Male and female patients, officers, students and staffs posted in different ward actively participated in the picnic. Music, games and special food was arranged.

During Durga Puja male and female patients were taken to the Puja Pandal were the participated in the Puja and also enjoyed "Mela" organized on that occasion.

Male and female patient also participated in the Independence Day and Republic Programme of RINPAS. They participated in Flag hosting and sang patriotic songs.

CANTEEN FACILITY

There is a full fledged canteen in the campus of the Institute near OPD where tea, snacks, meals, cold drinks etc are available on reasonable rates to the patients, their guardians & staff members. The canteen has been renovated. Separate kitchen, stores, selling counters and seating places have been built. Nescafe corner is functioning.

LAUNDRY

The institute has 200kg capacity Mechanical Laundry. Patients linen and clothes are collected and delivered at the ward itself.

MINERAL WATER PLANT

The institute has one Mineral Water Plant having capacity of 1000 ltrs. per hour. Mineral Water is distributed to the wards in sealed container.

BIO-MEDICAL WASTE MANAGEMENT

Existing Incinerator has lived its life and at present it is not functional. A new Incinerator will be installed after the inspection of State Polution Board.
